

TRIBUTE TO E. T. SETON

100 Friends of Naturalist and Author at Greenwich Service

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GREENWICH, Conn., Nov. 10—

Exercises in memory of Ernest Thompson Seton, naturalist and author, who died at his home in New Mexico on Oct. 23, were held this afternoon in the Greenwich Library. Mr. Seton had been a resident of Greenwich from 1896 to 1930.

Attending the service were more than 100 former neighbors and men interested in scouting and outdoor life, including thirty-five of the original forty-two members of the first "tribe" of Woodcraft Indians, an organization founded by Mr. Seton in 1902 and later merged with the Boy Scouts of America. Also present were Dr. James E. West, Chief Scout of the Boy Scouts; Dr. Clyde Fisher, president of the Campfire Clubs of America; Mrs. Grace Seton, Mr. Seton's first wife, and their daughter, Mrs. Anya Seton Chase.

A eulogy was delivered by First Selectman Wilbur M. Peck, a former Woodcraft Indian, and the Greenwich High School chorus sang several of Mr. Seton's favorite songs.
